

SPECIAL AWARD FOR JUVENILES

Dr. A.E.J. Went donated a special award for the best specimen taken by a juvenile who has not reached his or her fourteenth birthday on 31st December, 1995. The award goes to: Louise Hamilton, 14 Carneybaun Drive, Portrush, Co. Antrim, BT56 3JA, for a Trigger Fish of 3 lbs. 12 ozs. taken on the Causeway Coast on the 2nd August, 1995.

TEN SPECIES AWARD

In 1976 the Committee decided to recognise the angling prowess of those anglers who have authenticated claims for specimens of 10 separate species of fish. Only 22 of these awards have been made to-date. During 1995, one angler qualified. Mr. Gerald Fitzgerald, 13 Marian Place, Caherciveen, Co. Kerry.

THE MINISTER'S AWARD

In 1993, the Minister for the Marine sponsored an award for the best specimen fish of the year. The largest fish in each of the 80 categories (other than a new record) is compared to the existing record and expressed as a percentage of that record. The highest percentage value indicates the winner.

This year the award goes to Garnett Coulter, 24 Kilmore Park, Kilmore, Co. Armagh., for a Rudd of 3.86 lbs taken at Annaghmore Lake on the 20th May, 1994.

SPECIAL NOTICE

From January 1st, 1994, all claims must include the name of the water in which the fish was caught (e.g., Monalty Lake) and in the case of the larger systems, the area (eg., River Shannon – Rooskey).

LIMITATION ON NUMBER OF CLAIMS

A maximum of three (3) awards will be made to any particular claimant for a single species in any one year. However, provision will be made that when the angler achieves this target and subsequently captures larger fish, these will be taken into account but the final number of awards for any species in a single year will not be more than three awards. By including this latter provision, it will ensure that the anglers competitive spirit is kept up and higher achievements could still be sought.

EXCLUSION FROM SPECIMEN STATUS

Where species of fish are introduced to a fishery at or above existing specimen weights, those species from that particular fishery shall not be considered for specimen or record status. Escapees from fish farms either freshwater or marine are also excluded.

WEIGHING OF FISH

The Committee insists that all fish be weighed on scales which are verified for accuracy. Shop scales normally used in trade are checked regularly by the Department of Weights and Measures and are acceptable for weighing specimen and record fish. Some scales not normally certified by the Weights and Measures Authority for trade can be certified by them for accuracy. Such scales if certified in advance are acceptable to the Committee for weighing purposes and the certification will be valid for one year from the date of issue of the certificate of accuracy. Scales which are not certified at the time of weighing will not be accepted nor will certification in retrospect for such scales.

METRIFICATION

As and from 1978, the schedule of specimen weights on the Specimen Fish Claims Forms has given the weight in lbs and ozs., and also in kilos and grammes. Claims will be accepted under either system until we eventually go metric altogether. As many weighing scales also weigh in decimal instead of lbs. and ozs., claims are also accepted in lbs. and decimal of lb.

COMMON SKATE

In the interest of conservation of the species, the Committee during 1976 decided to remove the Common Skate (Raja batis) from the list of eligible fishes and not to consider any claims whatsoever, except for a possible new record (i.e., a fish weighing in excess of 221 lbs.) The Committee has been delighted with the response to its appeal and it is gratifying to know that in most angling centres throughout the country, common skate are returned unharmed to the water. The situation came up for review at the Committee's final meeting for the year 1980 and it was decided to extend the ban until further notice. The Committee in the meantime will keep the situation under annual review and looks forward to the continued co-operation of anglers in the conservation of the species.

CAPTORS ADDRESSES

Because of difficulties in establishing eligibility for the Ten Specimen and Ten Species Awards, captors are advised to inform the Committee of any changes in their addresses.

DISTRIBUTION OF SPECIMEN AWARDS

The number of specimen fish taken by visiting anglers in recent years may be of interest for purposes of comparison. The details are listed below for

RULES

PLEASE READ CAREFULLY

- (1) IRISH SPECIMEN FISH COMMITTEE: This Committee consists of representatives of the Irish Angling Federations and the Government Departments and official organisations interested in angling. Its objective is to verify, record and publicise the capture of large fish on rod and line in Irish waters. A list of Specimen Fish is published annually by the Committee. Only fish which can be fully vouched for as to weight and species can be accepted and listed by the Committee.
- (2) FAIR ANGLING: "Fair Angling" means any legitimate method of angling with rod and reel which is recognised as a fair and sporting method. A fish must be hooked in or in the immediate vicinity of the mouth when it has taken the bait or lure; fish which have been foul-hooked, even accidentally, are not eligible. A fish in respect of which a claim is made must be hooked, played and brought to gaff or net by the angler UNAIDED, though the fish may be gaffed or netted by another, and it is permissible for the person using the gaff to take hold of the trace or doubled line (in the case of big game fishing) to steady the fish when it has been played out and brought within reach. Breakage of rod, reel or line, or alteration or substitution of tackle, while a fish is being played, disqualify it for claim or record purposes. A fish may not be shot, lanced, clubbed or harpooned before landing. Claims for fish caught during the statutory close season for the species (where this applies) cannot be accepted.
- (3) **WEIGHING:** Fish must be weighed in the presence of independent, reliable witnesses on a properly certified scales, e.g., a shop scales or an official club scales which is covered by a certificate from the local Weights and Measures Officer. Claims cannot be accepted in respect of fish weighed on scales inappropriate to the size of the fish, e.g., fish in the 2 to 5 lb range weighed on balances weighing up to 100 lbs or over and graduated in large divisions. Claims cannot be accepted in the case of fish which have been weighed on board a boat. **Please note:** Weighing scales must be covered by a Certificate of Accuracy at the time of weighing. They cannot be certified in retrospect, i.e. after the fish has been weighed.
- (4) **IDENTIFICATION:** The identification of a fish must be fully documented where there is a possibility of its confusion with any other (and particularly larger) species. For this reason, the Committee, in respect of some species, insists on scales from the fish, close up photographs or the actual body as actual proof of identification before it will consider claims. Scales must be submitted in respect of claims for SALMON, SEA TROUT, BROWN TROUT (including SLOB TROUT). Any brown trout taken in tidal waters, i.e., in the sea or in an estuary below the freshwater boundary as defined for that river

will be regarded for claim purposes as a slob trout. About 50 scales scraped from each shoulder of the fish should be sent with the claim.

The fish itself should be forwarded for identification to the Irish Specimen Fish Committee, Mobhi Boreen, Glasnevin, Dublin 9, in the case of fish taken in the Republic of Ireland. The actual body must be forwarded for identification in the case of the following species:- DACE, RUDD, RUDD/BREAM HYBRID, ROACH, ROACH/BREAM HYBRID, MACKEREL, SCAD, HERRING, SHAD, FLOUNDER, DAB, BRILL, MEGRIM, GURNARDS, GREY MULLET, ANGLER FISH, LESSER SPOTTED DOGFISH, THREE BEARDED ROCKLING, SMOOTH HOUND, RAYS BREAM, CUCKOO WRASSE, TORSK, "RIVER" EELS taken in tidal waters and GARFISH (head and gills only).

CLEAR, SHARP, CLOSE-UP PHOTOGRAPHS, showing the entire fish with its fins and other features easily seen, and not fore-shortened or obscured by shadows or bystanders must be provided in the case of TOPE, SHARKS, SKATE, RAYS, MONKFISH, POLLACK, COALFISH, BALLAN WRASSE, TRIGGER FISH.

f necessary, the fish should be hung up. In the case of skates and rays, photographs of both back and belly surfaces should be provided and particulars of the coloration given (with particular reference to the presence of dark or grey spots, or streaks or patches on the belly side). Samples of the teeth should be furnished in the case of Porbeagle and Mako Sharks. In addition, there should be a clear close-up photograph showing the jaws and teeth exposed.

(5) LIMITATION ON NUMBER OF CLAIMS: A maximum of three (3) awards will be made to any particular claimant for a single species in any one year. However, provision will be made that when an angler achieves this target and subsequently captures larger fish, these will be taken into account but the final number of awards for any species in a single year will not be more than three awards. By including this latter provision, it will ensure that the anglers competitive spirit is kept up and higher achievements could still be sought.

(6) SENDING FISH TO THE COMMITTEE:

Please

(1) Notify the Committee when a fish is being sent in for identification (Telephone Dublin 8379206).

- (2) Do not forward fish to the Committee before Bank Holidays or weekends; (keep in a cold store or preferably frozen if fish cannot be delivered quickly on or before Friday afternoon).
- (3) Please attach a label to each fish forwarded for identification giving the captor's name and address, date and place of capture and the weight of the fish.
- (4) Fish (except small examples which have been previously soaked in formalin for at least 12 hours) should not be sent in polythene bags or wrapped in aluminium foil as this causes very rapid decomposition. They should be wrapped in greaseproof paper and then in newspaper and brown paper.
- (7) AWARDS: Anglers whose claims have been accepted by the Committee will be awarded special "Merit Badges" in the case of Specimen Fish and Silver Medals in the case of Record Fish. Specimen Fish Certificates will also be issued in respect of all ratified specimen fish, special medals to anglers who have captured ten or more species and special badges are issued each year for fish of exceptional merit though not of record size.

"40 Years A Growing"

THE IRISH SPECIMEN FISH COMMITTEE which during 1995 entered its 40th year was the "brain child" of Dr. A.E.J. Went (Chief Scientific Officer, Fisheries Branch, Department of Agriculture) and Dr. Michael Kennedy, (Chief Officer, Inland Fisheries Trust Inc.,). They were gravely concerned at the time that there was no machinery in existence whereby the capture of record or notable fish taken by angling could be authenticated and recorded and knowledge of them was being lost to posterity.

Representatives of various angling interests were invited to a meeting at which it was proposed to set up a Committee to record not only "record" fish but also notable fish above minimum or specimen weights which were to be decided for each species. As a result, the Irish Specimen Fish Committee came into being in April, 1955.

The first Committee was: Chairman, A.E.J. Went, D.Sc., Hon. Sec., Seamus Davin (Bord Failte) with representatives of the I.F.T., (Dr. Michael Kennedy), Irish Federation of Sea Anglers (Capt. C.P. O'Toole), National Salmon Anglers Federation of Ireland (R. Rice); Trout Anglers Federation of Eire (J.F. McCarthy) and the Editor for the time being of Stream & Field in Ireland (George Burrows). Later the Angling Council of Ireland, the National Coarse Fish Federation of Ireland and the Irish Trout Fly Fishers Association were invited to participate. Capt. C.P. O'Toole is the only member of that first committee who is still involved.

The drawing up of a list of "specimen weights" was not an easy task. On the freshwater side, a River Brown Trout of 5 lbs and on the Saltwater side, a Bass of 10 lbs were regarded as notable fish. Other species were not so easy as there was not enough data available on which to base definitive specimen weights. However, it did not take long for things to settle down and for the Committee's weights to become the standard that anglers sought to achieve.

The next task was to examine the existing records of exceptional rod caught fish and a list of verified Records was drawn up. Of the 71 existing Irish Records, only 9 were taken prior to the Committee's inception. Some like the 57 lbs salmon taken by M. Maher on the River Suir in 1874 may never be beaten as the days of big spring salmon are long gone. When I first served on the Committee, the specimen weight was 40 lbs but as the number of big spring salmon declined, the specimen weight over the years came down by 5 lbs increments to its present weight of 20 lbs.

The first Report covered 1955 and 1956. A total of 25 specimen fish (17 freshwater and 8 sea fish) were listed and included one new Irish Record – a Hake weighing 15 lbs. 2.75 ozs. The report for the following year showed 23 specimens listed including another record, a Brown Trout (River) weighing 20 lbs taken on the River Shannon by Major Hugh Place.

During the summer of 1958, I became Hon. Secretary and the work of the Committee became centred in the offices of the Inland Fisheries Trust Inc. where it remained until that organisation was subsumed into the Central Fisheries Board where it now resides. The number of claims began to increase rapidly as the work of the Committee became known and the solid silver record medals and specimen fish certificate and badges became highly sought after.

The Presentation of Awards in Dublin became an annual event to which anglers travelled from the far ends of Ireland. The late Ben Barkin, Angling Adviser to Bord Failte in Britain,

organised presentations in London and Birmingham or Manchester for British anglers who were due awards. An invitation to one of these presentations was highly prized and were always well attended. As the events were also well attended by the angling press, Irish angling received tremendous publicity.

Annual Presentations were also held in the Netherlands, Germany and Belgium with the assistance of Bord Failte and in Belfast with the assistance of the Northern Ireland Tourist Board. During the 1980's, due to budgetary restraints, it was not always possible to arrange an annual event in the U.K. and on the Continent, but I am delighted to see that in the last few years, overseas presentations are again being arranged.

As the Committee's work became better known, the number of claims received each year increased dramatically. From the mere 25 fish listed in the first Report, the list expanded to no less than 690 accepted claims in 1968. Indeed, by the time the Committee came of age in 1975, it had dealt with a total of 7,334 claims and by 1995 it has reached 17,841.

A by-product of such a volume of claims was a lot of data of scientific value and important information on the distribution of big fish of different species throughout the country. This resulted in papers being published by Dr. A.E.J. Went, Dr. Michael Kennedy, Dr. Patrick Fitzmaurice and Eileen Twomey on a variety of species including Brown Trout, Sea Trout, Coarse fishes, Bass, Skates and Rays, Cod, Haddock and Cartilaginous fishes. These papers were included in various Annual Reports over the years.

The Committee exists for the purpose of authenticating rod and line captures of big fish. It would defeat the purpose of its existence if claims were accepted which were not fully authenticated. It is not a question of the veracity or otherwise of the claimant but of furnishing proof of the details in a claim which is acceptable not only to the Committee but to anyone who now or in the future may wish to examine or perhaps challenge the records of the Committee. For this purpose, the Committee retains in its archives all details of every claim received from its inception in 1955. In any claim, three things must be established:-

- (1) that the fish was caught and landed by fair angling;
- (2) that the weight of the fish was as claimed;
- (3) that the species of fish was as claimed.

The first requirement rarely presents problems. The second requirement sometimes creates difficulties even though it must be obvious that this point is a critical one. If the weight entered in the records is to mean anything, it must be accurate. The only guarantee of accuracy of weight is an attested scales – a scale such as a shop scales (or any other scale) which is covered by a certificate of accuracy from the Weights & Measures Officer. When the Committee refuses to accept a claim weighed on other than an attested scale, they are doing so because there is no proof that the real weight is as claimed and it cannot therefore be entered in the official records.

The third requirement which covers identification also causes problems. Many anglers, probably most, are quite competent to identify the fish they catch. However, Red Gurnards have proved to be Tub Gurnards and Rudd have been proven to be Hybrids so many times that in the case of specimen fish, there must be a strong presumption of misidentification until the contrary is established. The former Irish Record "Brown Trout" – the famous "Peppers Ghost" caught last century – proved to be a salmon when the Committee finally tracked down and examined the stuffed fish. The present Irish Record River Trout when caught was believed to be a salmon and was sold as such, but luckily was brought to expert notice. A previous Irish Record Sea Trout was claimed as a brown trout and there are other examples, too numerous to mention.

The Committee has no choice but to demand proof of identity of any fish which may be misidentified. Clear sharp photographs may be satisfactory evidence for some species though such photographs must obviously show clearly the features which are of diagnostic importance in the species. In other instances - the various forms of trout for example - set of scales must be provided since scale examination affords the most reliable evidence of identity In other species, again the actual fish must be forwarded for scientific examination.

Even in the Committee's very early days, there were anglers who did not wish to kill their catch. Today the feeling is even stronger and more widespread and covers all types of angling. Many coarse fishermen are understandably reluctant to kill their fish and ask "why can't the Committee accept a photograph or some scales from the fish?" With this, the Committee can sympathise but unfortunately the suggestion is not practicable. Many cyprinids - rudd, roach, bream and their allies - hybridise freely. Some of the hybrids may be fertile, at least to some degree, so there is the possibility of second generation hybrids and of back crosses with the parent species. Moreover, roach/bream hybrids are superficially like rudd/bream hybrids and even the sharpest of professional photographs will not permit of making the fin ray and scale counts essential for accurate identification. Furthermore, it may be necessary to examine the pharyngeal teeth, so for some species, the actual fish must be produced if the claim is to be

Fisheries biologists attached to the C.F.B. in Dublin and to the Fisheries Laboratory at the Cutts in Coleraine identify the fish. Fish arrived by all methods. Some arrived in good condition but others had to be collected from freight depots, bus stations and postal sorting offices as postmen refused to deliver the revolting packages. There was a tendency to parcel fish in polythene bags or kitchen foil and the parcels when opened often displayed two eyes in a odoriferous sludge. The pleas from the long suffering biologists were finally heeded after many years and the printed advice on the claim forms on how to parcel the fish were

During 1966, the Committee decided to introduce two new awards, namely a special pin to recognise the prowess of anglers who had caught 10 or more specimen fish and a special Fish of a Lifetime Badge for an exceptionally good fish of below the record weight. Ten years later, another special award was introduced. This was the special medal awarded to anglers who had specimen fish authenticated in 10 different species. The first anglers to qualify for this medal were two Kerrymen - the late J.B. Healy and Patrick Maguire, both from Caherciveen, Co. Kerry, In 1992, a further category of award was introduced. The Minister for the Marine sponsors an award for the best specimen based on a percentage of the record

The Committee is a voluntary body which depends for funds on subscriptions from well wishes. It is fortunate to receive funding from the Central Fisheries Board, Bord Failte, the Department of the Marine and is also supported by the Angling Federations and a large number of angling clubs and individual anglers. These have supported us very generously over the 40 years. A special word of thanks is due to the Central Fisheries Board who permits

I retired from the position of Hon. Secretary during 1988 and was succeeded by Kevin us the use of its offices and facilities as well as their staff. Linnane - a new broom - who has already made his mark on the Committee, as is evidenced by the brighter, more colourful and expanded Annual Reports, I know that he is in for a long stint in the engine room for while Chairmen may change, the poor Hon. Secretary will have his nose kept stuck to the grindstone. I know that the Committee will prosper from his work and will still be "growing" strong after another 40 years.
